What To Expect This Time Around

Key People

- **Your Advisor**—will guide you through the process and be sure you are meeting your requirements; will help you consider your strengths and weaknesses
- Your Current Teachers—can give you insight into your strengths and weaknesses in their subject area, can help guide you through their department's offerings and which might be best suited to you and your interests
- **The Department Chairs**—will make placement recommendations and will discuss those placements with you at your request
- Your **College Counselor** can help you create balance
- Your **Dean** can help you with the big picture stuff (and a lot of other things if needed)

Focus

- A major, 3 credit course that allows you the opportunity to explore an area of specific interest. You will develop an intensive research paper and then a fieldwork project in the spring
- Sign up for the course if interested, but note that you will need to <u>APPLY</u> separately, so you will have to indicate 2nd and 3rd choices for a major when you register
- In order to complete the project, you must complete your Global Lit, Physics, and Arts requirements by the fall


Language

Mathematics

- 3 years required
- Full year courses; including AP Calculus or AP Statistics
- Elective offerings as well; including Finance, Statistics, and Advanced Topics in Geometry

- Strongly recommended beyond the requirement

Health & Wellness

The new requirement for Health and Wellness is changed from eight semesters to four. Students can continue to take health and wellness classes if they wish but the current 11th grade has met the full requirement.

Supporting Adolescent Group Experience (SAGE)

- Experiential learning, mentoring, problem solving, social intelligence
- This class will meet 3 times a week you will earn 3 credits & a grade for your work
- Application process is open to juniors and seniors only
- Ms. Frankel will send out an email with info about how to apply keep an eye out for it!

Peer Mentor Program

For students interested in working with the ninth graders in their advisory groups.

Students meet in their mentor class two times per week to plan, discuss and debrief their work and meet with their ninth grade groups every other week during advisory. Application open to 11th and 12th graders only. Look for an email with application instructions soon.

Other Courses to Consider

- There are several Ethics electives available, including:
 - Two classes conducted in Spanish: Ancient Philosophy and Modern Philosophy, both for Honors credit
 - Ethics & Justice, Western Philosophy, World Philosophy
- Independent Studies

Community Service

- 40 hours of service work is required to graduate
- Your reflections (written, visual or audio) on this work is also required.
- <u>Service and reflections are to be completed before spring break of senior</u> <u>year</u>

- To apply for on campus parking for next year, students must have the service hours completed by this coming August.


- 3/11-Curriculum Night with parents
